What Is Central Lutheran Church's Endowment Fund?

A number of years ago members of Central set up an endowment fund. Some of the money was given at death through a will or life insurance policy and other money was just donated to the fund. One large gift at death was designated for members attending Lutheran colleges. In 2024 Central asked the court to modify the terms of the will to allow these funds to be used for other, non-budgeted, expenses of the church. This petition was granted in November. The current terms of the Endowment Fund allow Central to allocate 5% of the balance on September 30 of the preceding year for these expenses. This can be for major repairs such as the elevator or organ, other items that are not covered in the



annual budget or mission projects. Education will remain a primary if there are students attending Lutheran universities. You are encouraged to include Central's Endowment Fund in your annual giving, estate planning or as a beneficiary on a life insurance policy. Recently the fund has received contributions through an estate and also from members. The endowment fund is a way of helping to sustain Central in the years to come.

Chugach Community Solar is coming to Anchorage and this presents an exciting opportunity for Central and maybe for you. Chugach Electric Association is putting the finishing touches on a project of 1560 solar panels located near the Dimond Center and they are currently accepting applications for Chugach members to "rent" these panels at a rate of about \$110 per year. The Chugach member would then essentially get credit for the energy the panel produces and the value of the energy would be deducted from their bill. It is expected that this would probably mean paying more for energy now, but it would provide a way to support diverse, sustainable power in Anchorage.

Central Lutheran currently pays Chuqach in excess of \$20,000 per year for electricity. Members can help defray this component of the church budget by donating (on top of your usual offering) to enable to the church to rent panels. This would be a way to help the church and help the environment. If you are interested in learning more about this opportunity for church or for your own electric bill, please talk with Lisa Bulkow, Larry Helgeson, or Hank Koegel. A Brief Synopsis of the 2025 Alaska Synod Assembly

On April 25 to 27, the 2025 Alaska Synod Assembly was held at Joy Lutheran Church, Eagle River. It was a time of prayer, song, stories of faith, and fellowship drawing our far-flung congregations together. The business conducted included four resolutions, a budget plan, and a touch of controversy.

The Resolutions:

- 1. A resolution of thanks to Joy Lutheran Church for hosting the Assembly.
- 2. A resolution to confer the title of Bishop Emerita upon the Rev. Shelley Wickstrom.
- 3. A memorial asking the 2025 Churchwide Assembly to commemorate the National Day of Remembrance for Indian Boarding Schools annually on or near September 30th, take steps to increase awareness, and move toward providing needed documents and healing for survivors and their descendants.
- 4. A memorial asking the 2025 Churchwide Assembly to commemorate Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women (MMIW) Day annually on May 5th and take steps to increase awareness and advocacy on the issue.

All passed with overwhelming support. (Lisa threatened to hurt me when I jokingly suggested I might vote against thanking Joy Lutheran.) (Note from Lisa – that last part is totally not true.)

The Budget Plan:

The Synod is also struggling with a decline in income. As a temporary measure, the Synod voted to fill the gap by letting Bishop Tim move to a hybrid position. He will work half-time as Bishop and half-time filling the Director for Evangelical Mission (DEM) position Pastor Lisa Smith Fiegel recently stepped away from. Since the DEM position is paid by the national church, this will bridge Synod funding until we can work out a better solution.

The Controversy:

The assembly heard briefly from a member of Resurrection Lutheran Church in Juneau. There are clearly still raw feelings about how things ended up in the controversy downgrading their mission serving unhoused and marginalized people. The congregation remains split, Karen Perkins has been removed from the roster of Ministers of Word and Sacrament, and there is a lawsuit before the Alaska Superior Court. Please pray for everyone involved to find peace and healing.

First Nations Version:

Ed Luiten, Jan Adasiak

As part of one of the Faith Stories, each congregation was given a copy of First Nations Version - An Indigenous Translation of the New Testament. The FNV was developed with input from over 25 North American tribes. It uses vibrant imagery and is a refreshing way to take a new look at our text. It will be available in the church office if you are interested. As the FNV puts Romans 16:24: May the kindness of our Honored Chief Creator Sets Free (Jesus) rest on all of you. Doubts and Joys

"Consider it pure joy, my brothers and sisters, whenever you face trials of many kinds, because you know that the testing of your faith produces perseverance. Let perseverance finish its work so that you may be mature and complete, not lacking anything."

James 1: 2-4

I have to admit that I found this verse through a Google search as I was reflecting on this past month with In Our Backyard. There have been many times that my faith has been tested, my faith in this project, my faith in that we are doing something that is helpful, and my faith that God is guiding us. Maybe the doubt also had to do with all the turmoil in the political state of our country and the almost overbearing weight of the pain in the world.....

However, the month of April has brought many joys for In Our Backyard. The most exciting news is that one of our guests was able to move into permanent housing on April 1st! MH is a 76 year old Vietnam Veteran who found himself homeless right near the start of the pandemic. He had been employed since the age of fourteen. One thing we both have in common is that our first official job was scooping ice cream during the summer months! MH had an unexpected hospital stay in 2020. By the time he was discharged from the hospital, his apartment building was empty and boarded up. He slept on the streets for a time until it got too cold. Then he slept on the courthouse steps telling the officers that he would rather go to jail than die in the cold on the streets. Police officers took him to the hospital to get checked out. After that he was sent to various congregate winter shelters. Unfortunately, those shelters kept getting closed, leaving the residents with nowhere to go. For five years MH drifted between congregate and non-congregate shelters. He had different case workers interact with him, but

since he had to keep moving to different locations, there was no follow up. He lost his SNAP benefits, Veterans benefits, and Medicaid, mainly because his mail was sent to different addresses. When MH moved into a different shelter, his mail was either lost or he received it too late and missed deadlines. MH came to In Our Backyard when he was staying at the Cold Weather Shelter on 56th street. A Catholic Social Service (CSS) case manager referred him to In Our Backyard.

He stayed with us for about three months. During that time, he was able to connect with a case manager on a consistent basis, get connected to a case manager from Supportive Services for Veterans Families (SSVF), get his benefits reinstated and get housing support. With IOBY's connections with the Fairview Community Council, we were able to find him an apartment in a fourplex in Fairview near the Senior Center. The Veteran's office provided furniture, and we were able to provide a kitchen start up kit through a donation from a local neighbor. Since moving to his new apartment, we have visited him about once a week and he is very happy.

We were also able to welcome two new guests to IOBY. Both gentlemen are waiting for housing vouchers to come through and for their benefits to be reinstated. With the support of case managers that meet our guests at the site, those important tasks are in the final steps of completion. Volunteers have also been able to take guests to medical appointments that had been long overdue. A guest who has been with us for four and a half months now has a full time job and is actively apartment hunting. He has a housing voucher that allows him to move in as soon as he can find an approved place.

Doubts happen whenever we have had to exit a guest from the program. When a guest is consistently breaking rules, even with compassionate accountability talks, it is inevitable that they will be exited. Questions arise as to what we could have done differently to support the guest, how we could have

screened better, what other resources could we have offered to the guest? Reflections are an important part of any program, but ultimately, if a guest is harming himself or others and refuses to change the behavior, they will be removed from the program and given the opportunity to be housed in a program with more resources. For myself, and others on our Board, this is not an easy task. We have all given time, energy, and prayers helping the guest achieve their goals. The prayers will continue even though that person is taking a different path.

Joy is in the works as new buds are starting to burst open. We have exciting landscaping and gardening plans, a new 12x16 community building planned, and will soon be burying the waste water line and installing a waterline to the site. Thank you to the local Lions club who has been investing time and energy to secure a major Lions Club grant to support these projects.

In Our Backyard was also invited to participate in Anchorage's Coordinated Response to Homelessness

and to present at a meeting on the Mayor's plan for Micro Units for Recovery Residences. Word is getting out that Central Lutheran and In Our Backyard are actively working to address homelessness in our community.






