



### Central's Cold Weather Shelter for Children and Families

My family is starting to notice that there is a bit of a nip in the air in the mornings. We also know that there are many homeless families with children who may still be camping outdoors or sleeping in their cars. I would like to thank those who helped at the Family Cold Weather Shelter last winter and invite others who might be able to join us this coming winter.

As many of you know, Central participates with other Anchorage churches in providing a cold weather shelter for families during the winter months, October through the following April. The shelter began about fifteen years ago when we housed families in our church on Wednesday nights, but families had to pack up their belongings and find their to leave earlier in the morning to get to work on way to a different church each night, which was very difficult for many of them.

Three years ago, Christian Health Associates received a grant to provide temporary housing for eight families. The funds support rental and upkeep of a duplex, as well as a case manager and a housing coordinator. The grant provides for household supplies, most food, and other personal care items. It also supports an outside source for laundry services and a cleaning service that comes weekly.

We have a wonderful group of volunteers, many of whom have been with the program from its beginning, when Larry Graham organized Central's participation. We want to thank these volunteers for their help last year: Steve Lambert, Mike Graham, Brian Bjorkquist, Bonnie Kragt, John and Lisa Bulkow, John Stabb, Jon Goltz, Dahna Graham, Eva Wissmann, Mary Mayer, Diane Evans (a friend), Jim and Judith Muller, and Tara Orley and Deni Callahan (both from Amazing Grace Lutheran Church).

Our responsibility each Wednesday night is to provide three volunteers who can spend the night in the

facility. Each volunteer stays awake for a three-hour shift and can usually sleep about six hours while the others take their shifts.

Volunteers are asked to help only one Wednesday night each month, from October through April. That would be a total of seven nights over the winter months. Since many of us have travel plans or family commitments, we are able to allow for considerable flexibility in our schedules. We are asked to have at least one volunteer at the shelter from 6 pm until 8 am. But the fire department requires three volunteers from 10 pm until 7 am. Some volunteers choose to have dinner with their families and arrive at the shelter later in the evening, while others have time.


While they are at the shelter, volunteers may want to visit with the parents or the children, but we also find it is a good time to get to know each other better.



Central Lutheran Church has had a long-time partnership with the Kuwaa Mission, a non-profit group of folks walking with the Kuwaa people in a remote area of Liberia. The Kuwaa Mission, started in 2008, has helped to get supplies to build freshwater wells, medical clinics and school facilities to that remote area.

The Kuwaa Mission recently lost its treasurer with the unexpected passing of Carol Norquist. The books are The Dick and Doris Thompson Memorial Day Care kept on Quicken and donations tracked thru PayPal or checks or credit card payments. We are not a large NGO in terms of financial transactions per month and we only meet quarterly. We are a large NGO in terms of the number of Liberian people we help with education, health care and sanitation. Thus time commitment would not be great. However we do need someone familiar with these financial management tools or a quick learner. ### July—August 2025 Prayer Letter

Prayers ascending for the students and staff of the Dick and Doris Thompson Memorial Day Care Center and Elementary School! This month, we give thanks to God for the Day Care Center and elementary school in the Fassama Township, Belle District, Gbapolu County.





Center and Elementary School is named in honor of the Thompsons, whose ministry and Liberian home were located near Fassama in the 1970s. Reports from the community are that the school is one of the leading schools in Fassama in the Kuwaa Region of Liberia. The school began in 2023. In the first year, there were 29 students. We are so pleased to report that the student body of the school has grown to 90 students this school year. The student body is currently made up of 58 girls and 32 boys.

The Kuwaa mission, with the support of your prayers and financial contributions, makes a difference in the lives of the people of Fassama. The children are learning to read, to do mathematics, and other things which will help them and their community as they grow up. Reading and writing in English are good things. But the unique thing about this Fassama school is that it addresses one of the most difficult challenges we face today in Liberia and the rest of Africa – we are forgetting our mother tongue. The English language, the official, commercial, and social language of Liberia, is slowly and effectively forcing the Liberian languages into extinction. The disappearance of African languages has become alarming enough to claim the attention of reputable international media like the BBC and American Public Radio. The United Nations Educational. Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) estimates that about 40% of the world's languages are endangered. Most of these are African languages. Sadly, the Kuwaa or Belle language is among those heading toward extinction. All the factors leading to this extinction fit the Kuwaa situation. One factor that has had the most impactful negative effect on the heart language was the prohibition of the use of indigenous languages in school. While that had its plus side in making all Liberians be able to communicate with each other in a shared language, it helped immensely in relegating the heart language with all of its cultural values. Today, most of our children and grandchildren do not speak the Kuwaa language, even children in the villages.

Dick and Doris, after whom the Fassama school is named, were one of the two couples that the Lutheran Bible Translators assigned to the Kuwaa region in the 1970s to help translate the Bible into the Kuwaa language and produce Kuwaa literature that would

help preserve the Kuwaa language. The good news is that there is now a Kuwaa version of the New Testament, and progress is being made on the Old Testament translation. Despite this progress, however, we cannot be content with this accomplishment; we need people who can read the language.

This is why a class in the Kuwaa language at the Dick and Doris Thompson Memorial Elementary School is a thing that calls for celebration!

This move is so impactful that actions are being taken to extend the system across the district, even in public schools. The district and county education officers have shown their support for the idea by selecting pilot sites and including Kuwaa teacher training in the upcoming September 2025 educational training workshop. Please keep the Dick and Doris Thompson Memorial Day Care Center and Elementary School in your prayers.
